





- **Nancy Hart:** Legendary frontier scout and messenger.

- During the American revolution, Georgia's government was called the Provincial Congress.
- In 1777, Georgia's first Constitution was written.
- This Constitution created a government with 3 branches.
 - Executive
 - Legislative
 - Judicial
- This is called the Separation of Powers.

- * **Establishment of a New Government:** Georgia adopted its first constitution in 1777, establishing a representative form of government.
- * **Land Distribution and Expansion:** The state confiscated Loyalist lands






